## Welcome!

Thank you for visiting our virtual classroom. We'd like to show you some of the things we do in a typical day at school. We are playbased and themebased, so our activities change out each week with the theme.



### **Circle Time**

#### We start our day at circle

- We work on our number and letter of the week pages
- We talk about our theme of the week
- We sing songs, say rhymes, play instruments, and move to music
- We read a story
- We explore math and science concepts
- We talk about our project of the day



## Science Table

We explore the scientific world with fossils, feathers, water, instruments, animal and plant life cycles, seeds, and even volcanoes!



### **Tool Table**

#### Great for developing fine motor skills and learning cooperation

We build marble runs, make aliens and sea creatures, hammer pegs, saw wood, use a drill to insert screws, build bird nests, put together race cars, repair a flashlight, and build robots.



# Math Table

Activities at the math table help develop skills including counting, number recognition, patterning, odd/even, one to one correspondence, sorting, shapes, money, estimation, and fine motor.



## Home Living

#### Imaginative Play

Our Home Living area changes on a regular basis. It has a kitchen and office area, with accompanying toys, but it is so much more. It becomes a vet clinic, the moon surface and mission control, a campsite in the woods, Santa's Workshop, a pet adoption center, a garden, a farmer's market, and a bird habitat. We also use our imagination in the classroom with the fairy tale castle, the bear's cave, an undersea adventure, and a space rocket!



### Easels

We use many tools to paint at the easels. We have sponges, scrapers, brushes, stamps, our fingers, and even celery!

We use tempera paint, watercolors, oil pastels, crayons, chalk, markers, and colored pencils.



## **Creative Arts**

### Bringing out the artist in each child

We provide examples of projects students can do, along with the materials to make them. But we always have paper, glue, markers, crayons, scissors, tape, hole punches, and glue sticks for students to use to create whatever they want. There is a lot of freedom of expression at this center. Last year, the popular thing to make in the afternoon class was masks, with large hole punches used for the eyes!





### Sensory Table

The sensory table may have rice, beans, corn, water, ice, coffee grounds, or dried leaves in it. Toys are placed in with the materials and students have a great time exploring the different textures and playing cooperatively.



## Game Table

#### Learning to take turns

We have a variety of games at this table, but they all require more than one player. We play memory games, board games, matching games, and building games. We use dice and spinners. Students work on counting and one-to-one correspondence moving their markers around a board. They learn to work cooperatively with each other.



## Toy Table

Each week we have new toys out at this table. The wooden tree house, the Fisher Price school and house, Playmobil farm, and frog pond are just some of the fun items available.



# Play Dough!

#### Fine Motor Fun

Students love playing and creating with playdough. We use cookie cutters, textured rollers, rolling pins, cutting tools, and more. Play dough can be a very soothing activity for students' emotional health. Our scented homemade play dough is also a sensory experience, as well as a great social experience as students share tools and discuss what they are making.



### Blocks

Blocks provide a great opportunity for students to work together and use their imaginations. We use both large and small blocks, which provide hours of creative fun. Engineering and geometry skills are learned along the way.



# **Puppet Theater**

#### Telling stories to others

Children develop language and literature skills as they use puppets to tell stories. Their imaginations grow and they develop empathy as they take on roles of the characters. Puppets allow children to explore new ideas and concepts in a safe and comfortable environment.



### Projects

During project time, teachers work with a small group of students, observing and evaluating their developing skills and engaging in meaningful conversation that builds relationships.



# **Reading Nook**

#### Fostering a love of books

Children sit in the comfortable reading area, where there is a wide variety of books available related to our theme of the week. Pre-reading skills such as turning the pages, engaging with the pictures, pointing to the text, and telling familiar stories are important milestones on the path to becoming a successful reader.



### Cooking

We cook a lot in preschool! From stone soup and applesauce, to gingerbread men and pretzels shaped into our first initial, the projects develop a variety of skills from the fine motor cutting of vegetables to the math skills of sorting apples by color. And we have fun doing it!
